Chair Gray gave an overview of the 2021 Draft Budget sharing several details regarding the budget including revenue information, internal projects, overhead costs, local matches for consultant led project, and budget comparisons by year since 2018.

6. Assistant Planner Opening

Chair Gray congratulated Anna Pierce on her new position with MnDOT, informing everyone of an upcoming opportunity at Metro COG to fill her position.

7. **Agency Updates**

Chair Gray gave an update on the status of Metro COG and in-office staffing during the COVID-19 pandemic moving forward.

Mr. Gorden gave an update on Main Ave construction and said they are moving along well. City of Fargo is basically 100% staffed now an appointment is required to get in for meetings with anyone at the City.

Mr. Nelson said planning staff is all back in the office now too.

Mr. Atkins said the green light priority project went out for bid yesterday (6/10/2020) with bids due by July 2nd. He said that the underpass project at 21st St is postponed due to coordination with the railroad and will not wrap up until 2021. Mr. Atkins shared some data from a traffic camera volumes before the MN stay-at-home order, the week the order went into effect, and then more recent volumes. He said traffic is getting back to normal.

Mr. Wrucke said they are now back to normal traffic levels at a few locations in West Fargo.

Mr. Sahr said they have new local streets going in near the middle school and high school which are going to be finished prior to the schools opening.

Mr. Soucy said that at 76th Ave they finished paving and installing new lights at the roundabout. They also paved CR 6, west of the Sheyenne River, new bridge pavement on CR 31 just W of Harwood over the Sheyenne River, and a repaving project on CR 10 from Casselton to Mapleton.

Mr. Zacher gave an update on the I-29 grade raise project south of Fargo which is required for the FM Diversion project.

Ms. Safgren gave an update on MnDOT staff returning to the district office. All staff are currently still working from home, and MnDOT is in the process of preparing a planned approach to returning to the office. She said there will be a solicitation next week for the (Transportation Economic Development) TED program and there will be \$1.85M available (state wide) through MnDOT and will be available for locally led trunk highway projects related to economic development. There will be a virtual meeting on June 24th through MnDOT to go over the requirements of the program. Cost split is 70% state and 30% local. Chair Gray asked how close to construction selected projects have to be, Ms. Safgren responded that projects should be close enough to be let in 2022.

Ms. Sperry said they are slowly phasing into the office on July 6, 2020 starting with management and then everyone else slowly coming in.

Ms. Huston said that they have met with MnDOT on the 11th St grade separation and they would be creating a panel to work on the aesthetics. She also introduced new Moorhead Assistant Planner, Forrest Steinhoff.

Re: **Draft Metro COG 2021-2024 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)**

Metro COG staff have developed a draft 2021-2024 TIP that lists federally funded transportation projects for the named four-year period. Metro COG posted a legal notice in the July 1, 2020 edition of The Forum to begin the official TIP comment period. This comment period will begin on July 9, 2020, which corresponds to Metro COG's regularly scheduled Transportation Technical Committee meeting.

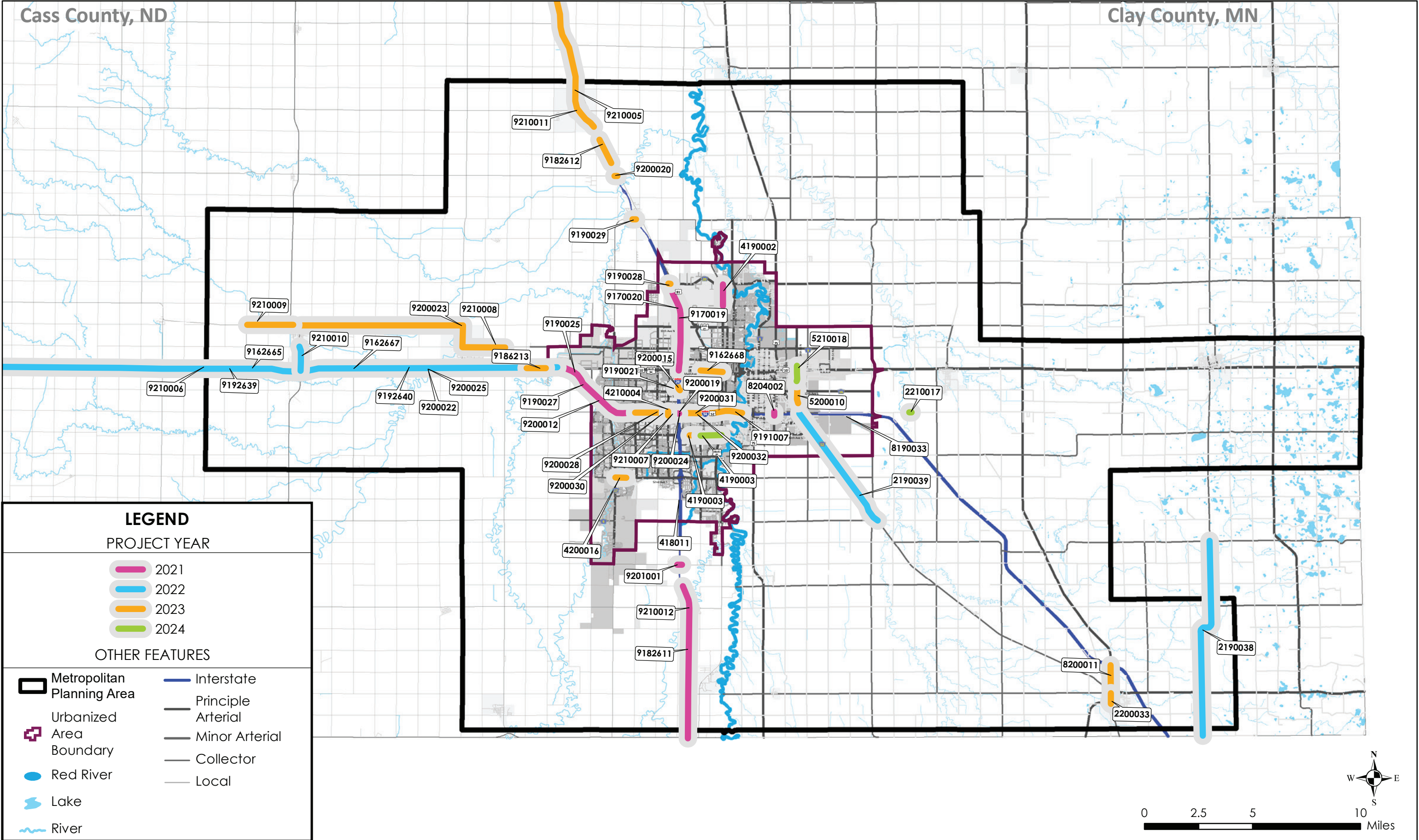
The Draft 2021-2024 TIP is comprised of projects listed in the NDDOT and MnDOT Draft State Transportation Improvement Programs (STIPs). The Draft 2021-2024 Project Listing and Annual Listing of Obligated Projects (ALOP) can be seen in **Attachment 1**. As the development of the TIP continues, staff will be refining all the necessary components of the TIP, including glossary with definitions and acronyms, locally funded projects referenced from local jurisdictions' Capital Improvement Programs (CIPs), financial plan and fiscal constraint, overview of federal aid programs, performance measures, and environmental considerations. A copy of the full Draft 2021-2024 TIP document can be found on the Metro COG website at www.fmmetrocog.org/Draft/TIP/Participate under the "Draft 2021-2024 TIP Material".

Excluding minor annual updates to all sections of the Draft 2021-2024 TIP, Metro COG staff have identified two critical language updates in the document that should be discussed with the TTC: (1) updating the definition of "Locally Funded Regionally Significant" projects and (2) updating the language regarding Metro COG's project solicitation, prioritization, and selection process. Proposed changes to the language in these sections can be seen in **Attachment 2**.

Another major change Metro COG hopes to achieve prior to releasing the Final Draft 2021-2024 TIP will be separating transit (FTA) information as its own section and stand-alone component of the TIP which will include separate transit project listings, ALOP, financial plan and fiscal constraint, overview of federal aid programs, performance measures, environmental considerations, and amendments and administrative adjustments.

In addition to the public comment period announcement, staff will announce further virtual and online public input opportunities including a virtual public open house, a virtual public hearing, and alternative options in which the public can review and comment on the document. This will be done via legal notice, email distribution, and frequent updates to the Metro COG website. Again, the webpage devoted to the update of the Draft Metro COG 2021-2024 TIP is:

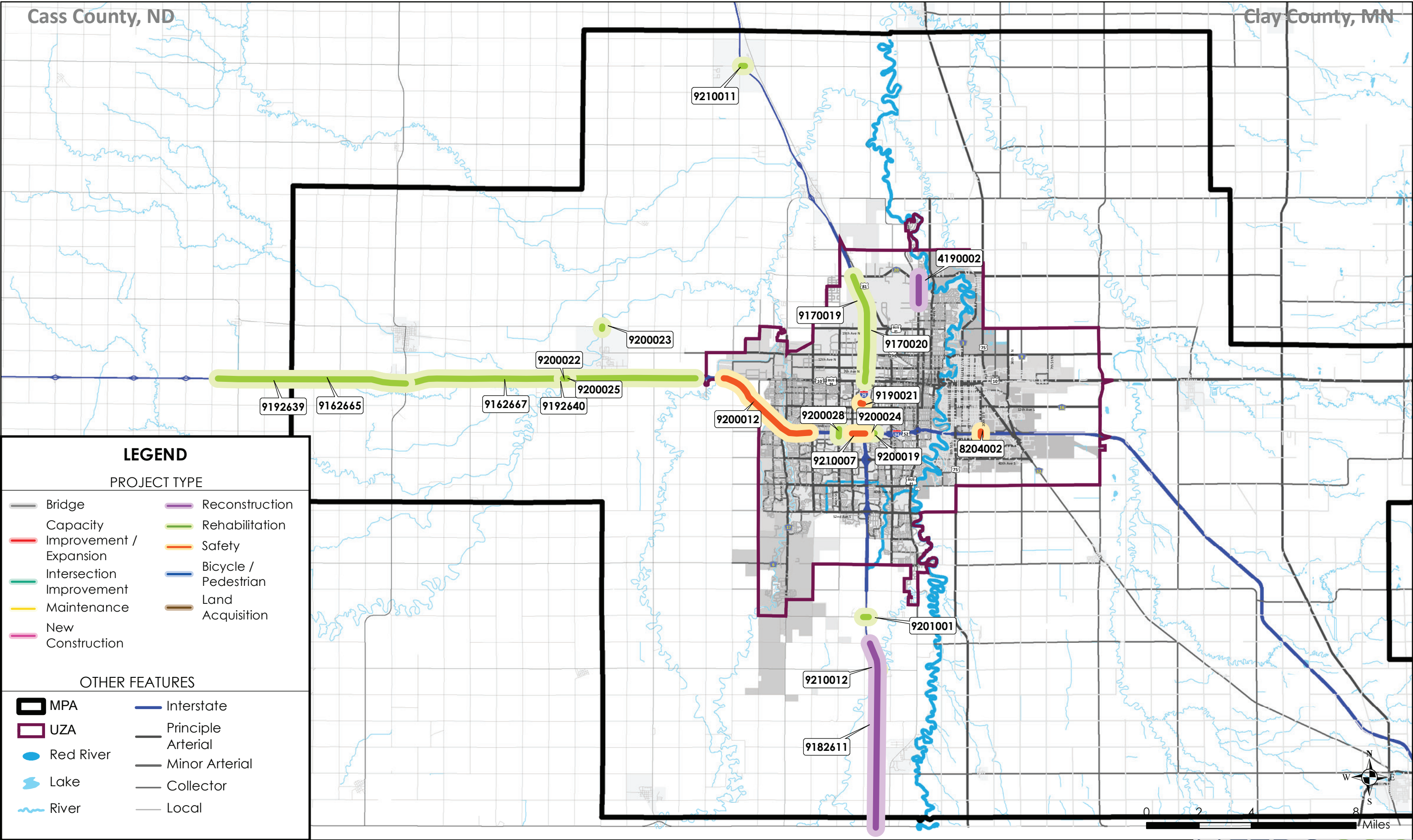
Section 2 | Project Locator Map

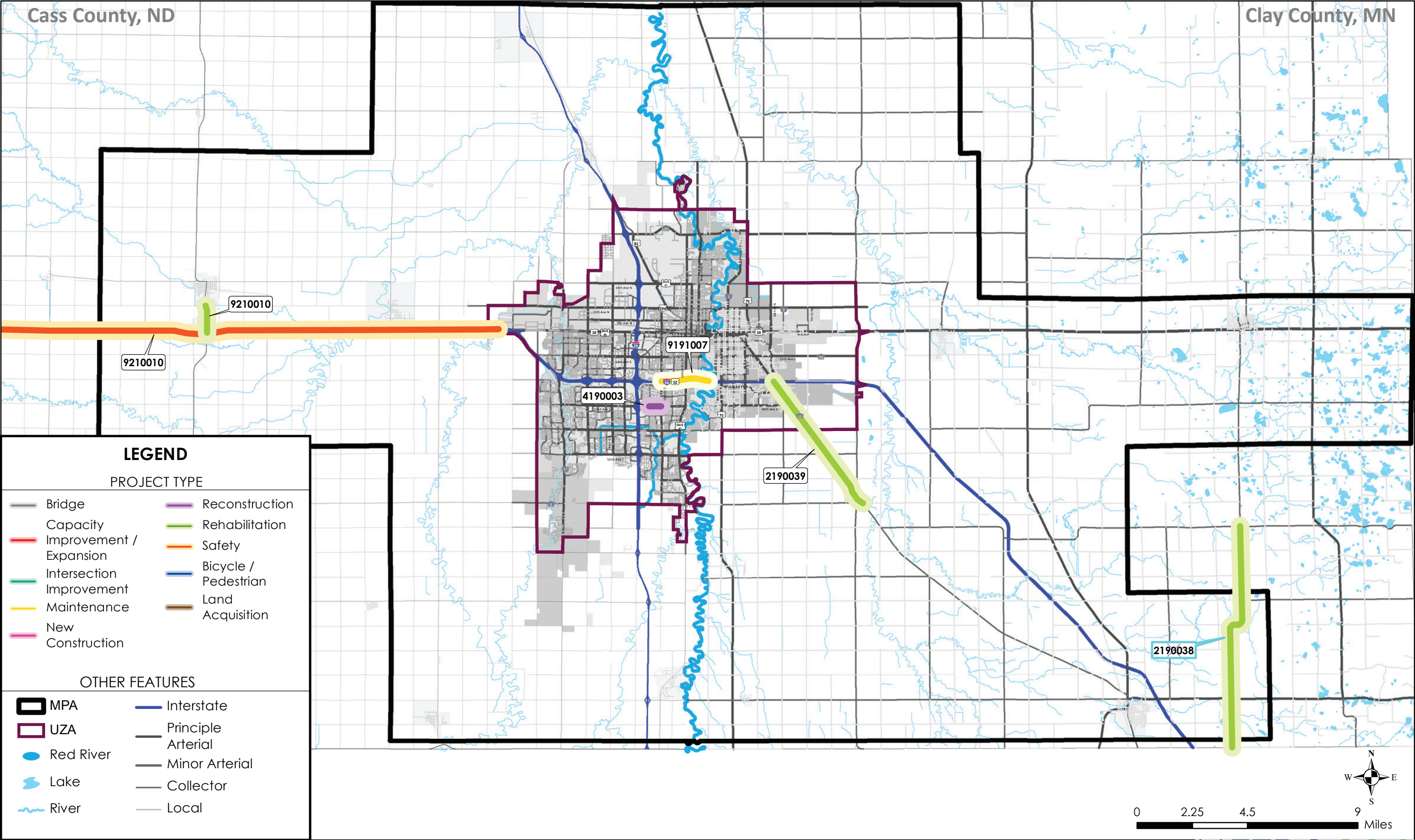

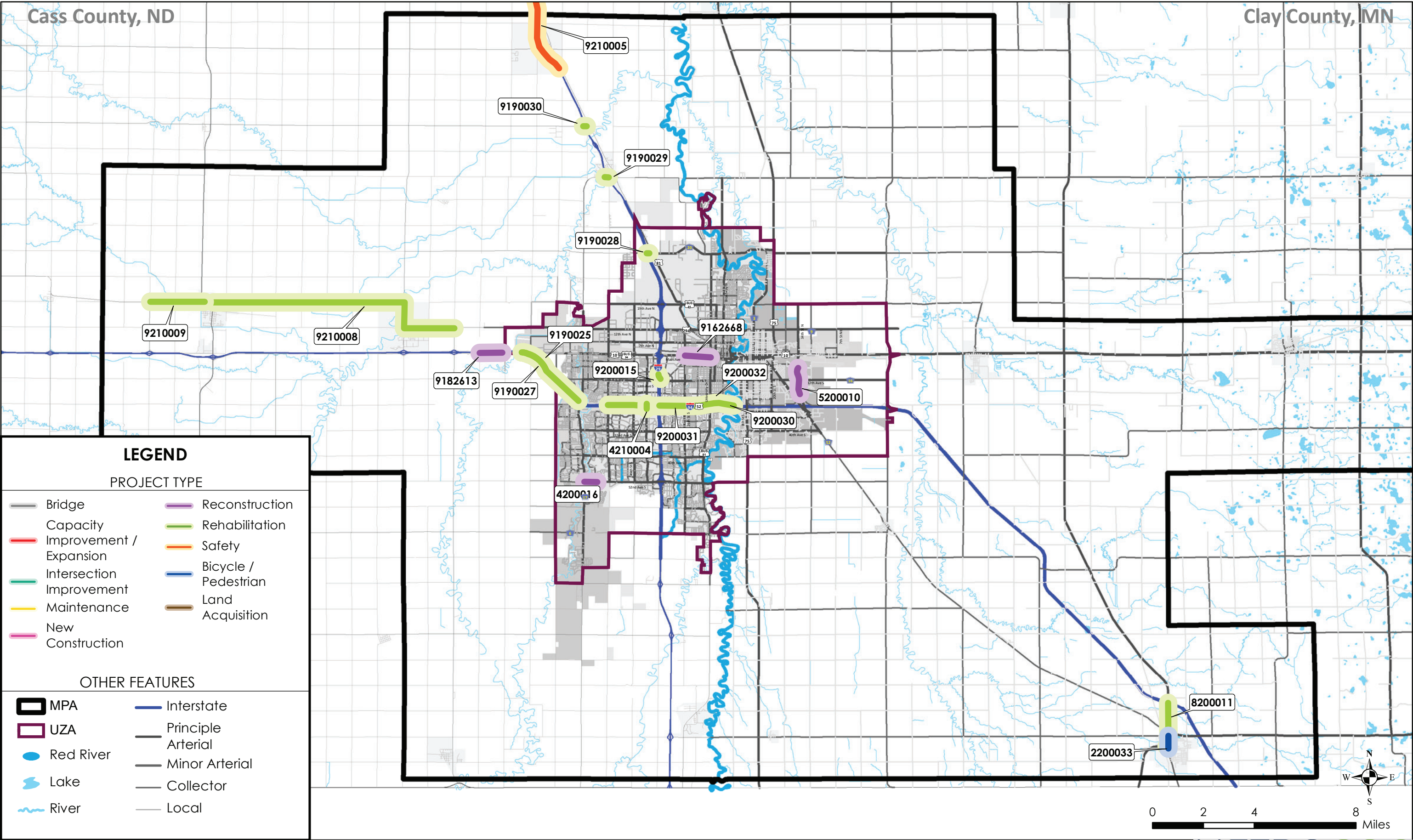

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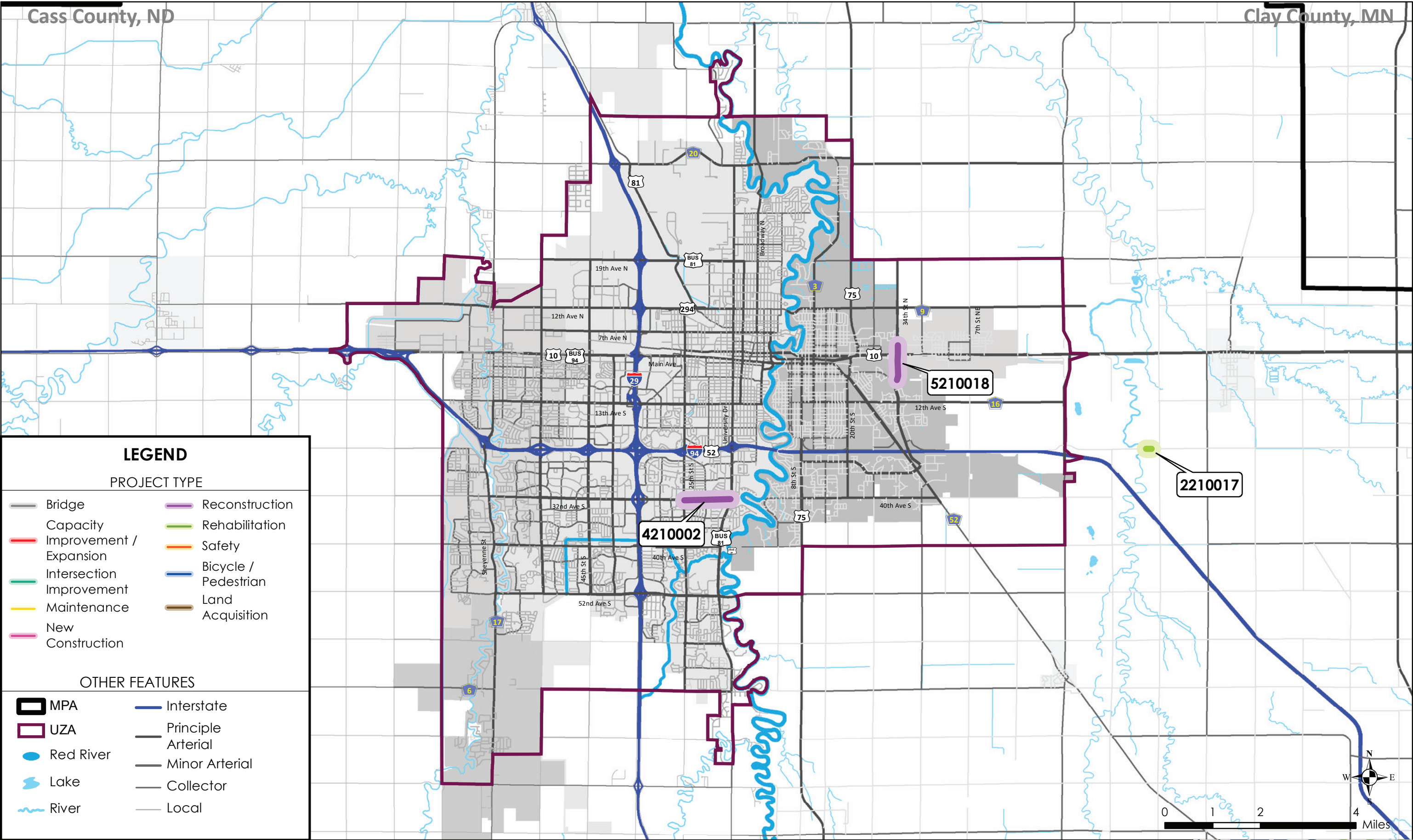

Regionally Significant Projects

Locally Funded Regionally Significant (LFRS) projects are projects that may not be funded with federal transportation funds, but involve major improvements to the transportation system in the Metro COG MPA. Metro COG may define regionally significant projects as one of three types:

1. Projects requiring an action by FHWA or the FTA, whether or not the projects are to be funded under Title 23 USC or Title 49 USC;
2. Projects funded by other federal agencies and not requiring action by FHWA or FTA; and
3. Projects that are not federally funded.

For Type 1 projects, typical TIP procedures apply and projects will be reported for all years of the TIP. Type 2 and 3 projects are listed for informational purposes only, however, are subject to the financial constraint of the overall TIP. In determining which Type 2 or 3 projects to include in the TIP for informational purposes, Metro COG staff, in consultation with state and local technical staff may consider the following criteria:

- Any project that may be determined to cause a significant lasting (greater than one construction season) impact to a facility that carries a Federal Functional Classification (FFC) of Principal Arterial, Minor Arterial, or Collector; or
- Any project that may make significant progress toward the goals and objectives as outlined within the Metropolitan Transportation Plan including but not limited to, performance measures, congestion management, MTP policy direction, safety, or environmental justice.

Project Solicitation, Prioritization, and Selection

Metro COG, in cooperation with NDDOT, MnDOT, and MATBUS cooperatively implement a process for solicitation, prioritization, and selection of transportation improvements which are eligible for federal aid. These procedures may be reviewed and modified annually as needed, in cooperation with NDDOT, MnDOT, and MATBUS.

SOLICITATION

Currently, competitive project solicitation is driven by the State Departments of Transportation (DOT) through a traditional process in which all Metropolitan Planning Organizations with an urbanized area (UZA) population below 200,000 go through. NDDOT and MnDOT will solicit projects from local jurisdictions, however the projects

must be submitted by Metro COG. For competitive Transportation Alternative (TA) or Transit project solicitations, projects are first prioritized by their respective Metro COG committees such as the Bicycle and Pedestrian Committee (for TA) and the Metro Area Transit Coordinating Board (for transit). Final project prioritization is recommended by Metro COG's TTC and Policy Board, which approves the final prioritized list of projects for submittal to the respective DOT.

It is anticipated that after the 2020 decennial census, Metro COG's UZA population will exceed 200,000 which will designate the UZA a Transportation Management Area (TMA). The solicitation process for MPOs within designated TMAs is different than the traditional process that Metro COG has gone through. With TMA designation, Metro COG will receive a direct allocation of Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) Surface Transportation Block Grant Program (STBGP) and Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Urban Formula Section 5307 funds, therefore directly driving the solicitation of projects and administering the direct allocation funds to local jurisdictions. State DOTs will still solicit projects from local jurisdictions through Metro COG for funding sources they administer which are outside of the direct allocation programs. With the designation of TMA, Metro COG will gain more responsibility and oversight of its urban program solicitation(s). Prioritization of projects become much more important when TMA designation occurs and must follow consistent, documented process.

PRIORITIZATION

Project prioritization comes directly from the policies, goals, and objectives of the currently adopted Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP). In the MTP, *Metro Grow*, prioritization metrics are used to score specific objectives for roadway expansion projects. For roadway preservation and maintenance projects, a policy level priority is given that states: "preserving and maintaining the existing network takes a higher priority than expanding the network". Therefore, projects with a preservation and maintenance objective are not scored against roadway expansion projects, however may be listed as short- mid- or long-term priorities for the FM Area. Similarly, bicycle/pedestrian, and transit projects are not scored against roadway expansion projects but are listed as short- mid- or long-term priorities for the FM Area.

Metro COG staff and the TTC prioritize projects based upon their objective scoring within the MTP including conformity with policies, goals, and objectives explicitly described in the plan. The TTC then recommends the prioritized list of projects based upon this information to the Policy Board, which has the final decision and authority to submit the final prioritization of projects to the respective State DOT.

SELECTION

Currently, because the State DOTs administer the competitive funding sources, each State takes into consideration Metro COG's prioritization when making project funding allocation decisions however, are not bound by the prioritization that Metro COG submits. This is expected to change for urban program solicitation when TMA designation occurs, giving full control to Metro COG and its partner jurisdictions to select projects from its prioritized list, subject to availability of funds.

The Transportation Alternatives (TA) program is a federally funded grant opportunity for projects that provide enhancements to alternate means of transportation such as bicycle/walking trails, safe routes to school projects, crosswalk improvements, and more.

In December 2019, Metro COG received Transportation Alternatives (TA) grant applications from local jurisdictions. A total of three applications were received – one from the City of Fargo, one from the City of Horace/Cass County, and one from the City of West Fargo. Once received and evaluated, Metro COG submitted the applications to NDDOT for project selection.

Of the three applications submitted from the Fargo-Moorhead Metro Area, two were awarded funding. Funding will be applied to fiscal year (FY) 2022. Below is a brief description of the applications. Also, **attached** are the letters sent from NDDOT to the jurisdictions.


